-IN LINCOLN, NEBRASKA

RAY & ETHEL PAGE HOME -2032 SEWELL ST

PAGE AIRFIELD--Lindbergh practiced landing & taking off.

Located near the Country Club of Lincoln. The historic marker is at 20th & HIGH ST at the entrance to the Woodshire neighborhood on the right as you enter Woodshire.

LINCOLN AIRPORT--Two bronze plaques are located at the main entrance of the airport

LINCOLN STANDARD AIRCRAFT COMPANY & FLYING SCHOOL-24th AND O ST. south side, presently an antique shop

STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY--1500 R ST. The resource library has the Page Scrapbook of articles, letters, and photos.

CHILDHOOD HOME-Northeast corner from QWIK-6, there is presently a home there. All Page buildings are gone. Interestingly, the home there now was the home of Norman Warren, founder of the Warren Hospital. The home was originally east of the hospital. It was a two story house. The second floor was removed and the home was moved to its present location.

WARREN BUILDING & OPERA HOUSE-511 Second St. This building was built in 1985-86 by Joshua Warren, brother of Norman. The Page family would have enjoyed the first floor businesses and the Opera House events.

PAGE STREET--named for the location of their home. Just East of the QWIK-6.

STEP-MOTHER'S & STEP-SISTER'S HOME-61.5 Chestnut St. This residence eventually became the home of Harriet Myers Moon Page and Phebe Moon. After his mother's death, his sister, Phebe Moon moved to 321 Chestnut.

STEP-SISTER'S HOME--Addie Moon Putt lived at 611 4th St.

ANDREW CEMETERY-Ray Page is buried just south of the Cemetery Directory in the Page/Moon plot. He was born on August 16, 1881 and died on March 17, 1933. The services were held at the Methodist Church. From the obituary-Because of the snowstorm making the highways impassable a special car was provided by the Burlington, for Mrs. Page and many of the Lincoln friends. The car was set off here and taken back into Lincoln at five o'clock. As a distinct mark of respect two large airplanes circled over Friend for half an hour after the remains of Mr. Page were laid to rest in Andrew Cemetery.
